

AIMS OF ASHFIELD BOYS' HIGH SCHOOL

At Ashfield Boys' we seek to create a school community which recognises the worth of the individual. We encourage self-discipline and expect, and take pride in, good personal relationships.

We provide a broad, general curriculum for the first three years which enables all pupils to develop skills which allow them to make informed career choices. Throughout the school we provide balanced and relevant courses which encompass and enhance the Entitlement Curriculum.

We believe that everyone should be encouraged to develop fully, intellectually and socially, in order to take his place in society as a responsible citizen.

We recognise the School as an integral part of the community and seek to encourage ways in which the School as a whole can foster links within that community.

We aim to-

- provide a wide and varied set of learning experiences for pupils suited to their abilities, previous experiences and ambitions, including offering wider horizons to those whose experience and ambitions may be limited,
- 2. develop those physical, intellectual, aesthetic and social skills necessary to playing a full part in the world of work, further education, leisure, home and community,
- 3. develop the ability to research, make decisions, and evaluate, by exposure to different forms of knowledge through working in a wide range of subjects,

 - (e) the provision of a year 13/14 Vocational Course.
 - (f) providing the delivery of the Employability Model in KS3 and KS4.

THE SCHOOL CURRICULUM

The curriculum policy is designed to deliver the aims and meet the objectives of Ashfield Boys' High School. The School is organised largely on a departmental basis. Heads of Department and teachers in charge are responsible for the curriculum in their subject, which is based upon guidelines set by the Core Management Team and Board of Governors. All schemes take into account the requirements of the Northern Ireland Curriculum. (The statutory curriculum at Key Stage 3 Rationale and Detail 'A' CCEA Publication 2007).

The syllabuses are constructed and teaching methods used so that:-

- 1. all pupils have objectives which will extend them and are attainable,
- 2. opportunities are provided for working individually, in groups and as a whole class,
- 3. interest may be encouraged through a variety of approaches and methods of assessment,
- 4. the syllabus for most pupils will prepare them for National Assessment at the end of Key Stage 4, for GCSE in year 12 and for either vocational education or 'A' levels in year 13.

All syllabuses are available to the Board of Governors, parents and the Department of Education. The curriculum must be sufficiently broad based to fulfil the aims yet allow some areas to be studied in enough depth to enable boys to have the opportunity to continue their studies at Advanced Level or at BTEC level 3 or Further Education.

In years 8-10 all pupils study a general course which includes English, Mathematics, Geography, History, Science, Information Technology, Religious Education, Spanish, Art & Design, Home Economics, Technology & Design, Music and Physical Education, Learning for Life and Work. Information Technology is taught to all classes as well as being included in other departmental schemes of work. Children with special educational needs receive support. All pupils receive Reading and Numeracy Support in year 8.

At the end of year 10, a choice of subjects is made from the subjects studied in years 8-10 plus Double Award Science, Single Award Science, ICT, Business Studies, Business and Communication Systems, Travel and Tourism, Hospitality, Moving Image Art, Photography and Media Studies. These subjects will be either GCSE or BTEC qualifications.

All pupils are encouraged to continue their studies into year 13. A selection of two year GCE courses in Art, Media Studies, BTEC Business Studies, BTEC in Engineering, Citizenship, Applied Science (Double Award), Applied Science Single Award, BTEC Sport, Geography, BTEC ICT, Mathematics, Photography and Moving Image Arts are available. Support classes in Mathematics and English are an integral part of the post 16 curriculum. A consortium arrangement exists with Ashfield Girls' High School to offer other 'A' Levels.

Careers guidance forms an integral part of the curriculum of the middle and senior school. Input from the Department of Employment is an important feature of this programme.

Pupils therefore have a wide and varied set of learning experiences across a broad spectrum of forms of knowledge and the Areas of Study, English, Mathematics, Science and Technology, Environment and Society, Languages and Creative and Expressive Studies. All boys should be prepared to continue their studies beyond GCSE.

The streaming of classes enables courses to reflect the boys' abilities and previous experiences while the element of choice may reflect an individual boy's specific interests and ambitions.

Specific schemes within departments reflect

- (i) the Entitlement Curriculum,
- (ii) the skills necessary to play a full part in the world of work, further
- education, leisure, home and community,
- (iii) an approach to the subject which will enable the boy to research, make decisions and evaluate within the criteria of that form of knowledge or area

and also develop the ability to work in groups and respect the opinions of others,

(iv) the level of work, which should be such that (a) it is within the capability of the boy, (b) it is assessed so that success is highlighted and self esteem can be built up, and (c) all pupils are extended so that horizons can be widened.

The organisation of Pastoral Care through class teachers, year teachers, and Heads of School reflects the importance, both of the individual boy and of his development within the school community. The school identity is furthered by school and year assemblies incorporating Acts of Worship, special assemblies and school events e.g. Prize Day, sporting events, class trips, school trips, team sports and club activities.

The curriculum is delivered by all teachers and reflects the aims of the school in so far as the development of the whole pupil.

Policies such as assessment, positive behaviour policy, teaching and learning policy, marking, homework policy, staff development, parental involvement also reflect the aims of the school.

ADMISSIONS CRITERIA FOR ENTRY OF PUPILS TO YEAR 8 IN SEPTEMBER 2014

The Board of Governors expects that all applicants for admission to Ashfield Boys' High School will support the ethos of the school as outlined in the Prospectus and that an application will indicate that parents agree to this precondition for entry.

Admissions Criteria - Criteria will be applied in the following order:

- 1. A boy whose parent / guardian has indicated a first or second preference for Ashfield Boys' High School.
- 2. A boy who is resident in any of the following postal districts at the time of proposed admission: BT1; BT2; BT3; BT4; BT5; BT6; BT7; BT8; BT9; BT16; BT18; BT19; BT20; BT21; BT22 and BT23.
- 3. A boy whose brother / half-brother attends or has attended Ashfield Boys' High School.
- 4. A boy whose sister attends or has attended Ashfield Girls' High School.
- 5. A boy whose father attended Ashfield Boys' High School and or mother attended Ashfield Girls' High School.
- 6. In the event of over-subscription after the application of criteria 1-5, then the final places will be selected on the basis of who lives closest to the school. This will be determined by measuring from the boy's house to the main entrance of the school (Holywood Road). The measurement will be calculated by using the 'Ordinance Survey Digital Distance and Area Measurement Tool (Map Console)'.
- This criterion will also be used to rank applicants if the school is over-subscribed at an earlier stage in the selection process.

Priority will be given to children resident in Northern Ireland at the time of proposed admission.

FORMS 8-10

On entry, boys are streamed according to Transfer Reports, Liaison Teacher's interviews with Primary School teachers, Midyis scores and the results of tests in English and Mathematics eg Progress in English(PIE) and Progress in Mathematics (PIM).

All pupils take part in the accelerated reading programme with selected pupils in years 8 and 9 receiving additional reading support. There is also a numeracy programme for all pupils.

We believe that it is essential for good progress that all of our pupils get extra assistance in English and Mathematics. To this end we have placed additional English and Mathematics teachers in Year 8, 9 and 10 classes.

The Learning Support programme is monitored by the Learning Support Co-ordinator (SENCO) who reports directly to the Principal and CLT.

PUPILS WHO REQUIRE ADDITIONAL LEARNING SUPPORT

YEARS 11 and 12

All pupils follow GCSE/BTEC Level 2 courses.

Courses are designed to ensure that our students have the opportunity to develop skills and qualifications that will help them progress to the next levels of education and/or employment.

There are several main areas of provision for pupils requiring learning support. These are:-

- Additional support in Mathematics and English.
- An educational psychologist from the Education Authority (Belfast Region), who tests pupils to diagnose areas of learning difficulty and helps form individual learning programmes.
- A Reading Support teacher works with no more than 3 or 4 boys in 55 minute sessions.
- A programme of diagnostic testing is in use to determine areas of difficulty and to monitor progress.
- Additional support is available from the Secondary Pupil Support Service.
- A Linguistic phonics specialist working with no more than 3 or 4 boys in 55 minute sessions.
- A lunchtime club and a homework club.
- Access to a Learning Support Assistant.
- A Learning Support Teacher who specialises in Numeracy and Literacy support.
- An EAL tutor.
- Outreach support eg Oakwood ASD Service/SPSS.

CRED Projects 2014-2015

Key Stage 3 <u>Year 9</u>

Exploring Religious Diversity with Little Flower Girls' School

As part of this project pupils' in 9a2 worked with Little Flower Girls' School meeting up on three separate occasions to explore religious diversity in Northern Ireland. In November 2014 the girls visited us, at Ashfield Boys' High School and as a group we visited St Mark's Church of Ireland on the Holywood Road. Rev. Dorrian gave the group an insight into being a member of the Church of Ireland. In February 2015, when we met again, we visited Little Flower Girls' School and then we walked together to visit the local Roman Catholic Church to get an insight into the Catholic faith. On our final meeting in March 2015, we visited the Islamic Centre. Here, we found out more about the Qur'an when the group had the opportunity to ask questions to the Imam. The group also had the opportunity to have traditional food, which the Islamic Centre provided. Overall, this was an excellent project and the pupils involved thoroughly enjoyed it. This project was funded through the CRED Enhancement Scheme.

Human Rights in Action Project with Co-Operation Ireland

In 2013 -2014 10a2worked with Little Flower Girls' School on a 'Human Rights in Action' Project, supported by Co-Operation Ireland and the Paul Hamlyn Foundation. They had the opportunity to undertake a civic-action Human Rights project and chose to look at the issue of healthcare. They also went on residential to Ganaway and developed their communication skills by delivering a presentation on their issue at the Ulster Hall, Belfast. In 2015 Co-operation Ireland launched their resource material on this project and invited two of our participants to share their experiences with a room filled with teachers. Our pupils did this with confidence.

Link with YMCA Belfast – Learning for Life and Work

The Year 8 and 9 LLW classes had the opportunity to work with the YMCA Belfast on bespoke Citizenship programmes focusing on Equality and Diversity issues. They enjoy the active nature of these sessions and look forward to Peter and Brian coming in from the YMCA.

<u>Key Stage 4</u> <u>Year 11</u>

Intergenerational Project with Sydenham Court

The year 11 COPE class were actively involved in an intergenerational project with Clanmil Independent Housing schemes. They had the opportunity to work with people living with dementia on art and gardening projects following on from the success of our innovative art project, called the Lantern Light Project the previous year. The pupils have established a real rapport with the tenants of Sydenham Court. They really look forward to visiting them and assisting in anyway they can.

Key success: Trust Chairman's Award - £3000 for Sydenham Court recognition for the work of project by Health Trust.

Belfast Cuchullainns

Five year 11 pupils were involved in this initiative which aimed to build respect and relations between the two sides of the community by giving pupils an insight into Gaelic games. The project involved four schools in Belfast, namely Ashfield Boys' High School, Boys' Model, St Patrick's College and Corpus Christi College and all participants had limited or no experience of GAA. They had the opportunity to be coached by GAA coaches along with pupils representing the other schools and competed in the Cuchullainn Cup competition representing the Belfast District.

St Patrick's College Community Breakfast

In May 2015 St Patrick's College hosted their annual community breakfast and our Year 11 Cuchullainns and members of the band had the opportunity to attend. They were treated to a traditional Ulster fry and great company!

Development of Shared Education

In 2014-2015, we got further information on Shared Education and I worked closely with Ms Laura Matchett, Principal of Mitchell House to develop our bid for shared education. We applied for finance in May 2015 and received word in June 2015 that our bid had been agreed in principle; however we have subsequently experienced difficulties due to the criteria being adjusted. Target group are 13a4 – BTEC Hospitality and Horticulture

CAREERS EDUCATION, INFORMATION, ADVICE AND GUIDANCE (CEIAG)

In years 8 and 9 pupils have the opportunity to participate in programmes to assist their career option choices. Initially year 8 pupils participate in a Young Entrepreneurs (YE) course called 'Big School' to help them make the transition from primary to secondary school. At the end of year 8 they participate in a course entitled 'Moving On', which encourages them to set goals, prioritise their work and manage their study time. It provides them with the skills needed to tackle examinations in later years.

All classes from Years 10 to 14 have Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) timetabled classes to assist with their career planning and awareness of the opportunities available to them. During this time they have the opportunity to consider various aspects of the world of work and how best to prepare for life after school. The year 10 careers provision is currently being revised in light of curriculum change and the increasing importance of CEIAG in the developing school curriculum. In Year 10 all pupils will receive one period per timetable cycle of taught CEIAG. This will be further supplemented with one interview with their Careers teacher/Officer during this transition year. In Year 10 pupils participate in a course by Young Enterprise 'The Economics of Staying in School'. It investigates pupil options and is delivered to all class groups in the Year 10.

In Year 11 and Year 12 all pupils receive one period per cycle of CEIAG time. During this time they complete self-assessments, Individual Learning Plans (ILP) and investigate their learning styles. In Year 11 they investigate different types of careers and engage in planning a career path. In Year 12 the focus is on application procedures and selection, with additional support given for their ILP.

Time is set aside so that each pupil is given as much individual attention as possible. Careers Officers from the Department of Education and Learning are in weekly attendance during all three terms and we welcome parents to use this facility by being present at these consultations. Pupils in Year 12 receive, if required 2/3 interviews with the Careers Officer. Year 12 pupils will also receive targeted careers advice in small groups. This is also available for targeted pupils in Year 11. All special educational needs pupils have access to the Careers Officer from Year 10 with interviews given with parents as requested. In 2013-14 all Year 10 will also have the opportunity to attend an interview with the Careers Officer.

The department has access to computer facilities and utilises dedicated web sites to assist in careers choices and decisions through all year groups in school. A range of books and other information leaflets are available from the school library and Careers Resource centre.

Pupils are given courses related to Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) initiatives and attend events on STEM and Young Entrepreneurs. Part of the YE courses in school involve speakers from the STEM industries.

All pupils in year 11 will have the opportunity to take part in a work experience programme. The school is linked with the Business in the Community Charter Work Experience Programme, which provides supportive links between school and industry. Year 12 pupils also attend Careers conferences in specific industries during the year. Work experience reports are also included in Pupil Profiles. This, combined with an Interview Skills Programme, visits and talks from various experts, means pupils should have a basis from which to make choices in future options. This is designed to develop skills needed for the workplace. This is further supplemented with targeted careers interviews from DEL.

A Sentinus Employability Skills Programme is delivered in Year 11 to all pupils. It is an initiative which allows them to take part in activities which will help them gain the personal skills and qualities they need for employment. Part of this is Interview Skills with Mock interviews by external providers.

A strong careers component operates in the Years 13 and 14. Students in years 13 and 14 receive 1 period of Careers per timetable cycle. This develops existing career planning skills and explores further options. Students receive talks from the Careers Officer (DEL) on areas relating to further study. The students are given specialist booklets on university entry and personal statements to assist with the application process.

Students wishing to further their education attend University conventions, visit Universities and attend talks by University staff and pupils. Students also have targeted tutorials on student finance from BELB student awards staff. A student finance booklet is available to both students and parents, and a parents evening is held on university funding. The students in Year 13 and 14 attend a course on Personal Economics and Budgeting by Young Enterprise.

The School has strong links with several universities in England and students have the opportunity to visit these during Years 13 and 14. The students have visits from the Scottish Universities where they can discuss all options. Further development links with the University of Ulster Elite Athletic Scheme is available for Year 14 students.
