PASTORAL CARE AT ASHFIELD BOYS' HIGH SCHOOL

The unique and celebrated atmosphere in Ashfield Boys' High School is created by a Pastoral Care system that places our pupils at the centre of everything we do.

Positive relationships are built on the rapport that exists between the pupils and the staff who care, support, develop and challenge them to achieve their full potential in a fair and consistent environment.

Our pupil centred pastoral care system strives to break down the barriers to learning by putting in place programmes and supports to deal with your sons' social, emotional and behavioural concerns.

Counselling Service

Our in house Counselling Service is an integral part of the pastoral system and school life as a whole. The levels of trust and relationships built up through having a fulltime counselling presence in school ensure that our boys are able to access the support they need in dealing with problems and concerns. We also have links with New Life Counselling services.

Reward Scheme

Encouragement, praise and reward are an essential part of promoting positive behaviour at Ashfield Boys' High School.

To reinforce this we invest in a whole school reward scheme where boys with a good standard of attendance, punctuality, discipline and academic progress are recognised twice a year with trips ranging from the cinema, Dundonald Ice Bowl, paintballing at Shane's Castle to the pinnacle of the scheme where Year 14 boys travel to New York to expand their outlook on life.



Assemblies

The Assembly programme is delivered weekly and is made up of a balance of materials drawn from religion and current affairs. Our aim is to help our boys' develop both moral understanding and social awareness.

Student Council

The Student Council not only benefits those boys directly involved, by developing their confidence, communication and negotiation skills, but also the whole school by providing the means for all of our boys to communicate their views and opinions through their elected council representatives.

Peer Mentoring Scheme

The Scheme encourages our boys to be supportive of each other and reinforces the work already being done to provide the boys with a supportive learning environment.

Year 13&14 boys apply to become a peer mentor and the successful applicants are given training organised by Childline in listening skills, suicide awareness training by PIPS and taught about the importance of confidentiality and when information needs to be passed on.

Transition Programmes

The School's transition programmes are proactive in supporting our boys through the main transition phases in their education, P7 to Year 8, Year 10 to GCSE, Year 12 to A-Level. The supports commence with a team building residential and participation in the Barnardo's All Stars programme in Year 8.











Ashfield Boys' High school provides a wide and varied curriculum that fully meets the requirements of the Northern Ireland curriculum and the Entitlement Framework curriculum. We encourage our pupils to develop their skills in all subjects with further emphasis placed upon the STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) subjects. Our child centred approach, including differentiated tasks, ensures that our pupils experience a variety of teaching methods that enable all of our students to develop their skills and achieve their full potential. Our stimulating learning environment ensures that our pupils are challenged to be independent learners whilst acquiring transferable skills that will empower them to achieve the best they are capable of.

English in Ashfield

We recognise that English is essential for our boys to progress to the next levels of education and or employment; therefore, English is at the centre of all that we do. Once your place in Ashfield is confirmed we will assess your level of English in relation to Reading; Writing, Talking and Listening. This information helps us develop an individual plan for every boy, enables us to tailor our teaching and guarantees that all boys are provided with the best opportunity to succeed. If students require extra assistance with English, a variety of reading, linguistic and phonics programmes are utilised and co-ordinated by both the English and Learning Support Departments.

All boys are involved with the Accelerated Reader programme. Students read books of their individual choice and then take computer guizzes to check if they have understood what they have read. This initiative has seen all of our students engage with reading, the library and improve upon their reading skills. Quite simply English is at the core of our learning.

We are excited by our new jointly managed and governed Sixth Form with Ashfield Girls'. This will provide all of our students with a portfolio of subjects that will fully meet the Entitlement Framework enabling all students to flourish and excel.

Pupil progress is tracked four times a year and intervention in the form of mentoring is put in place for those pupils considered to be underachieving.

At Ashfield Boys' High School we aim to identify as quickly as possible children with Special Educational Needs. Our Learning Support Coordinator provides an extensive range of support both internally and through links to outside agencies such as Oakwood Advisory Service.

Information Communication and Creative Technologies

ICT is developing at an exponential rate never seen before. Consequently we will ensure that Ashfield Boys' remains at the forefront of these amazing developments. All students study ICT to at least GCSE / Level 2 standard and those boys who wish to continue their studies to 'A' Level / level 3 are able to do so via one of the many courses available through either Ashfield Boys' or our shared Sixth Form with Ashfield Girls'.

The next five years will see us build upon the current ICT resources; every classroom will be provided with state of the art ICT facilities, enabling all teachers to fully integrate technology into their teaching and learning. We also have a three year plan that will see 'Tablet / Smart' technology introduced across the school for all boys and staff. Exciting times indeed for Ashfield Boys' and ICT.
